GUIDE

for the international fire and rescue sport competition "BALTIC CHAMPIONSHIP 2016"

1. OBJECTIVES AND TASKS

The objective of the forty first (41st) Baltic Championship is to:

- strengthen the relationships between international rescue services, create athletic connections between the rescuers;
- promote and demonstrate the rescuers' professional skills and show high athletic results during the competition;
- popularise the rescuer's profession;
- develop and increase the rescuers' craftsmanship and athletic skills;
- inspire young and female rescuers to develop their skills and raise their level of athleticism.

2. ORGANISING THE COMPETITION

The competition is organised by the Estonian Rescue Board in cooperation with the Estonian Fire and Rescue Sport Association (Eesti Tuletõrjespordi Liit).

The competition will be carried out in accordance with the rules of the International Sport Federation of Firefighters and Rescuers.

The combat deployment competition will be carried out using the "ROSENBAUER FOX III" pump and ŠTORZ hose couplings.

3. TIME AND PLACE OF THE COMPETITION

Time: 12-14 July 2016 3.1. Arrival of teams on 12 July 2016 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Location: 1. Tamme stadium, Tamme pst 1, 50403 Tartu;

4. PARTICIPANTS

Teams from Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia will take part of the competition and men's teams from Ukraine and Poland will participate outside the competition. Women/juniors (1999 and older) and girls (2000-2001) from the Baltic countries will also be given the chance to compete outside the Baltic Championship competition.

4.1 The official composition of a team -29 people. Of which: Team representative -1, judge of international category -1, medic -1, drivers -2

4.2. Men's team -12 people, of which: representative -1, coach -1; athletes -10.

4.3. Youth team – **12 people**. Of which: Representative – 1, coach – 1; educator – 1; athletes – 9:

Juniors, group A - (1998-1999) - 3 athletes;

Youth middle age group, group B - (2000-2001) – 3 athletes;

Youth younger age group, group C (2002 and younger) -3 athletes.

4.4. Women's/girls' team -13 people. Of which: Coach -1; athletes (women/juniors) -9:Girls B class (2000-2001) -3 competitors

4.5. Men's teams from Poland and Ukraine are invited to participate as guest competitors, 13 participants from each country: of which representative -1, judge of international category -1, coach -1; athletes -10.

Team representatives will present the mandate committee with named entries, personal identification (passport, ID-card) and an insurance policy for accidents which is valid during the competition. The competitors will not be allowed to compete without presenting these documents.

7. CONDITIONS AND RULES FOR DETERMINING THE WINNERS

The winners will be determined according to the international rules.

There will be no semi-finals or finals in the 100m obstacle course run and climbing with the hook ladder disciplines.

The team standings between the Baltic countries will be determined by the smallest sum of points for places (men, youth). When these points are equal, the winner is the team with the fastest combined time for combat deployment. If the combined time is equal, the winner is the team with the fastest youth time. If this is also equal, the winner is the team whose youth team started earlier.

8. AWARDS

Teams competing in Baltic countries' competition will be awarded with cups and team diplomas.

In the men's and youth division the teams will be awarded with cups and team diplomas.

Teams (men and youth) who achieved the award-winning places in combat deployment and 4x100m relay, will be awarded with cups and diplomas. Members of the team will be awarded with diplomas, medals and prizes.

Three best competitors of each age group in the individual competition will be awarded with diplomas, medals and prizes.

9. COMPOSITION OF THE JUDGING PANEL

A judge outside of the Baltic countries with an international category will be asked to be the main referee of the competition.

The deputy main referee will be a judge from the organising country with an international category.

10. CONDITIONS OF RECEIVING FOREIGN TEAMS

Any expenses related to entering the competition (transport, travel expenses, daily allowance, etc.) will be covered by organisations that sent the teams to the competition.

Accommodation and catering expenses during the competition will be covered by the Estonian Fire and Rescue Sport Association (ETTSL).

The Latvian and Lithuanian teams must transfer the competition entry fee of 2000 euros to the following account by 14 June 2016 at the latest.
